## Role for economic committee debated

To be successful Eramosa's newly reconstituted Economic Development and Agriculture Committee must clearly define its role.

Both Eramosa Reeve Rick Hughes and committee chair Ross Durfey think the committee can play an active role in enhancing the well-being of Rockwood, and both suggest the same approach.

"I think this committee has to determine what the future economic drivers for Eramosa Township will be," Reeve Hughes said Friday.

"The committee must decide if tourism should be developed, if we should look at enhancing retail in the village or if we should try to find some other economic activity that is evolving out of this new economy that the Township could plug into.

"There needs to be a philosophical discussion about what is going to work in this new economy," Hughes said.

A similar committee established during the previous council's term did not get off the ground and although the Township advertised for members to the committee

following its election last fall, the committee is just now getting started.

Hughes suggested the committee take a look at economic development committees in surrounding areas to see how they are helping.

Committee chair Durfey said that they need a mandate from Eramosa Council.

"We need an overall picture of what the Township wants and we want to do. It's critical that we identify our resources and areas of need and decide what this committee can do for Rockwood."

Durfey said one of the first

jobs tackled by the committee was to begin to build the existing data base of village businesses and services at the Rockwood and Eramosa Business Association.

"We don't want to duplicate what REBA is doing there is a lot more in making a community viable from an economic standpoint."


