# Charlie's French fries

Charlie Farquaharson, the rustic autre persona of Canadian actor and comic Don Heron, hit the nail on the head when he implored Canadians to "exercise their French fries" when it came to politics and politicians. However, if politics and politicians keep going as they are now, we soon won't have any franchise to exercise.

The continual mindset for downsizing, restructuring and boundary alignments that have accompanied the recent recession, are certainly going to achieve one objective: reduce the number of local people who represent you at council tables. We are getting further and further away from participating democracy and closer and closer to autocratic decisions from far fewer people.

Not convinced? All you have to do is look at the most recent case right here in the Town of Halton Hills. Council last week, pressured by Halton Region to restructure, voted to reduce the number of wards in Halton Hills from four to three. Each new ward would consist of only two elected councillors, one local and one regional representative, and the new wards would have urban and rural components.

The result for Acton would be one less seat at the council table while the mayor of all Halton Hills would be reduced to sitting only at the Town table. Her seat at the Region would be gone, kaput, vanished, lost and any other term you want to employ. The irony is that quite likely the mayors of Halton's other three municipalities will continue to sit at the regional table.

Well, if this tinkering with the democratic structure is progress and good economics I'll be a Grade 2 dropout. If they really want to keep us from exercising our French fries then why not just have one ward for all of Halton Hills and let the mayor represent us at the Region. Extreme? Certainly, but if things keep going the way they are now it could happen down our bumpy, pot-holed highways.

Maybe, in their wisdom, councillors are trying to get rid of some of our more exasperating elected representatives: viz. Rob Heaton, whom the people of Glen Williams and their affiliates keep electing despite his maverick approach to politics. Fed up with his "disgraceful antics," his fellow Acton arena steering committee members dumped Heaton from the committee last week.

Acton councillor Norm Elliott summed up the committee's feelings saying Heaton contributed absolutely nothing to the committee but dissension and controversy. And, he said, it's going to get worse because no one knows what his plans are. I hold no brief for Rob Heaton and some of his antics and clearly understand the exasperation that Norm and his colleagues feel, but that's what democracy is all about, suffering those who march to a different drummer.

Anyway, do you get my point? The architects who play at continual downsizing would suffer no fools or political mavericks in their power grabs because fewer and fewer of us would be able to complain with any clout at the ballot box. We are being maneuvered closer and closer to rule from a few, in the name of economics and efficiencies.

Regional government has been with us now for almost 23 years and it has been a big change from the older county system which still operates successfully in most of Ontario, without the added cost. But each time the architects of change succeed, the tighter the noose becomes, the more our voices are muted.

Remember when this was the Town of Acton and we had six councillors and a mayor – seven people to look after the interests of the town and its residents. That was reduced to three when regional government was introduced in 1973, plus the mayor who was elected at large. The chance of anyone from Acton, unless they were exceptionally talented, of being elected mayor was reduced to almost nil.

Now they would reduce our representation to two people, increase the size of the ward and further tighten up representation.


And unless we have a further large swelling of population it is quite likely in another decade or two the architects of change and efficiency will be clamouring to reduce that voice to one.

I'm not buying it, nor the mayor being excluded from the regional council table either. It's important that the mayor has a grasp of what is happening not only at the local level but at the Region as well. And it is also important for Acton to have a voice at the Region's table, or risk once again being ignored by the clout from Oakville and Burlington.

Maybe, after all, there's a case for dividing Halton into two Regions – one south of the Dundas Highway (No. 5) and the other north of it. The chances of being swallowed whole then would be minimized, and the north could deal with its own problems and let Oakville and Burlington fight it out for southern supremacy.
