## Gargantua in Conservation Area

# Eramosa to get enhanced 911 service in 1997

Within two years Eramosa residents will have an enhanced 911 system to use in emergencies. At a recent special meeting, Wellington County Council decided to go it alone and not wait for Guelph to decide if it will be part of the enhanced 911 sys-

Once the new system is in place only the three-digit 911 will have to be dialed in an emergency. The enhanced system also includes life saving features such as a computer display of a caller's address and telephone number which will allow for quicker dispatch of emergency services, even when the caller can't speak.

The County opted to go with Bell Canada's 911 system and not wait for Guelph, which is still debating if it is cheaper to have the police or fire department take the calls.

Eramosa Reeve Rick Hughes said it will cost \$45,000 more for the County to go with the Bell system, instead of the Guelph fire or police department.

"While there could be a cost savings in going with a dispatch through the Guelph fire department, there was another immediate need to get on with it, so the County

Hughes explained last Wednesday.

"The county felt the additional cost - about the price of a cup of coffee - was offset by the fact that if it only saved one life, it was worth it."

Hughes said the Township recently completed its rural numbering program, giving every property in the Township an address that emergency services could be dispatched to, and renamed some streets to avoid confu-

The enhanced 911 system will cost \$90,000 a year to operate, versus \$45,000 with dispatch from the Guelph fire or police department.

That system will add 32¢ to the monthly phone bill of Wellington residents and \$1.20 per person per year to the tax bill.

"We're not happy about having to pay more but we waited as long as we thought we could," explained Wellington Planning Director Gary Cousins last Friday.

"I think that it's pretty good value when you consider what it does."

When the system is up and running, most likely in the last quarter of 1997, a call to 911 will be answered by a Bell operator in Sudbury who will route the call to police, fire or ambulance services to be dispatched.
