#### On the Coyote Stage

• Theatre Gargantua

Founded in 1992 by artistic director Jacquie Thomas, Theatre Gargantua is one of the few English-speaking Canadian companies that explores theatrical ideas over a long development process with a permanent ensemble. The group has created a sitespecific adaptation of its newest work, Raging Dreams for the Spirit Valley Experience. This performance will be a sneak preview of the full production which will open in November in Toronto.

#### Kim Renders

An accomplished actress who lives in Fergus, Kim Renders' one-woman show, Motherhood, Madness and the Shape of the Universe, premiered in Toronto in 1995 and went on tour to several Canadian cities. The play is an insightful and humourous look at parenthood, that very natural but profoundly complex life role. Renders combines a comfortable story-telling approach with a strong performance style.

 George Elliott Clarke Clarke is a poet and performer from Nova Scotia. It is said that "to read poetry by George Elliott Clarke is to be reminded that poetry matters; it is resonant with passion for

humanity, the land, the sea and souls wandering be-

tween." The power of Clarke's poetry is magnified by his dramatic presentation.

· Sarie Marais, rakufired pottery

Marais' sculptures, her "guardians," are compressed, simplified human forms. With archetypical serenity, their metallic glazing and upright pose project great visual strength, and will echo the dramatic shadows in the rock face.

·Elizabeth Fasken, weaving in fibres and textiles

Fasken has shown her weaving in two joint shows with Marais, which Marais describes as a natural collaboration. "The fabric softens the metal, and natural light brings out the vibrant moving colours of Elizabeth's weaving."

· Stephen William Lewis, welded steel sculptures

While he has exhibited in many group shows since 1966, and his pen and ink illustrations have been published in newsletters for many years, it is since his retirement that Lewis has been most active as a sculptor in welded steel.

· Wendy Cooper Melbye, copper enamelling

Much of Melbye's work deals with the spiritual and will therefore likely have a "spirit face," which, when installed, will blend with the figurelike forms in the rock face to compose a suggestion of life in connection with the earth.

· Harold (Hyahtsa) Rice, Native woodcarver

Since moving to Ontario, Rick has exhibited his works in many galleries and exhibition, including the Eden Mills Writers Festival from 1992 to 1995.
