housing manager Nan Gent stressed on Monday.

"We are an agent for Ontario Housing and we haven't been given any instructions to sell, but Ontario Housing is selling off a number of scattered units, none in our housing authority, which covers all of Halton," Gent

said. "We may get instructions in the future to sell off certain units and there are on-going meetings about what is to be sold and what isn't."

The Authority manages 18 semi-detached houses from 10 to 44 Holmesway Place, 12 seniors' apartments at 46 Holmesway Place and 52 senior apartments at 17 Elizabeth Drive.

Gent also said the province announced that none of the seniors' units would be sold, regardless of what happens to the other units.

"The province did say right at the beginning that whatever they end up doing, it will be done in such a way that it doesn't cause hardship to tenants.

"People won't be out of housing right away and will be taken care of in whatever form the government proceeds with," Gent said.

Halton Housing Authority units are leased on a rentgeared-to-income basis.

With the ambassador name change came a proposal to open the competition up to males, but that never happened.




