ASSIC boss faces funding challenges

The Acton Tanner Rosslyn Dowell returns to her roots taking over as ASSIC's

new executive director as of yesterday (Sept 3).

Dowell was a career civil servant with Health and Welfare Canada, on maternity leave, when she learned that ASSIC boss Peggy Balkind

was retiring. "This will be a good fit," Dowell explained recently, "because although my academic background is in gerontology and aging, and I had been working in senior management positions in the federal government, my volunteer work had remained in the aging field."

Dowell, now the mother of two small boys, said the job came just when the time was right for her to stop commuting and travelling for business.

"When Peggy retired I decided to apply for the job

because I thought it was time to get back to my roots and work with a social service agency, and I wanted to work in Halton Hills," Dowell said.

Dowell said she gained a good general knowledge of the community while working on a local committee with ASSIC and other social service agency staff to try to launch a pilot project for a multi-service agency, a plan that died with the former NDP government.

She said the greatest challenge ASSIC faces is finding funding-funding sources are

shrinking and it is becoming quite competitive.

"Because I spent a number of years in the funding business, on the other end receiving proposals, my experience in grant writing and my network of potential funding sources was seen as an asset by the ASSIC Board," Dowell said, noting another strength she will bring to the job is her experience in managing the huuman resources side of change.

Looking at the near future, Dowell said the ASSIC Board will likely identify what the greatest needs in Acton and Halton Hills are at this time with a community survey or needs assessment.

"We have a sense that things are changing. There might be a need for programs

for people who are unemployed or seeking other opportunities and we need to know how ASSIC might help and remain relevant," Dowell explained.

"We are also looking to provide some leadership in the seniors' area as community-based services develop in Georgetown," Dowell said, noting that ASSIC seniors coordinator Sue Haggith is now at the Georgetown Seniors Centre once a week to provide information services.

Dowell, anative of Orillia, attended the University of Guelph for her undergraduate degree and then received a Masters in Gerontology from the University of South Florida. After working in Ottawa, she moved to Georgetown with her family in 1989.
