Baptists add extra church service

"I think God's doing some exciting things at Acton Baptist Church," says Rev. Tom Cullen, on the church expanding to add a second Sunday service.

Beginning this Sunday, parishioners can attend either the 8:30 am service or the 11 am identical service. Sunday school, known as King's Garden, runs from 9:45 to 10:45 am.

The present congregation of between 60-70 is outgrowing the small building the Baptists have held for about 100 years, said Cullen.

"The dream now is to fill both services and move from there into a building program," he said, adding they are also talking to an architect about expanding the building in the future.

Cullen is hoping the extra service will also attract new members to Acton Baptist Church.

"A lot of people are looking for God, and I think some of them are going about it the wrong way, " he said. "All the churches in town have something to offer here and that's a living relationship with God."
