

### Rumours almost ready

Within the month (if all goes as planned) Rumours Furniture will be in its new home at the corner of Main and Guelph Streets in Rockwood.

Although owners Lou and Doris Bozzelli had hoped to be in their new home/workshop/store by now, renovations have taken a little longer than expected.

The Bozzellis gave up their Alma Street store last month and are currently operating out of a temporary home at a local farm.

### Signals now, please!

The August 23 accident in Brucedale, which killed four people and injured four others, prompted Eramosa Council to write the Minister of Transportation and ask that traffic signals be installed at the intersection of Hwy. 24 and Wellington County Road 27 within the next 12 months.

Although there is no indication that traffic signals would have prevented the accident, which is controlled by a flashing red over-head light and an over-size stop sign, Council noted that the MTO has identified the intersection as warranting full traffic signalization, but the date of implementation is unknown.

An MTO spokesman said that the project had been moved to the end of the five-year project timeline and that the five year period had just begun.

Council also wants the province to activate as soon as possible the newly installed traffic signals at the Hwy. 7 and County Road 27 intersection as the intersection has a major visual obstacle for eastbound traffic turning onto County Road 27.

### Movies move

You can still rent movies on Main Street in Rockwood, but not at the former Town and Country Video store, which has closed. You'll have to head a few doors south to the old Candy Factory.
