Council tours Fourth Line

A tour of Eramosa's Fourth Line on Saturday was designed to help Township Council decide what type of reconstruction project is needed between Hwy. 7 and Hwy. 24.

The tour was arranged following a public meeting on Sept. 9, called to outline options and receive input from residents of the road, which staff said already receives more attention, in the way of maintenance gravel, calcium and grading, than any other road in the Township.

Harry Bonner, who lives near the south end, said he favours reconstruction, "if it's done right."

"They should go head and rebuild the road first and widen it, put in proper shoulders and ditches and pave or tar and chip it so it's not full

of pot holes," he said.

Bonner said the Township will have to install a culvert in front of his property where the road blocks the water course and noted that there will be another meeting with a drainage engineer to discuss how to solve the road break-up and poor conditions caused by water saturation.

Art Davis, who lives near the top end of the Forth Line, echoed Bonner's concerns about doing the job right.

"I want to see the road bed raised, the ditches cleaned out and I'd like the road widened so there's a shoulder for farm equipment," he said Monday.

Davis also said it seems that a one-and-a-half lane bridge near his house will have to be replaced because it is structurally unsafe.

Township Superintendent of Public Works Len Smeltzer said that reconstruction,

including the addition of drainage culverts, several levels of gravel, ditching, shouldering and a tar and chip surface could cost \$90,000 for the 4.2 kilometre stretch between the railway tracks just north of Hwys. 7 and 24.

"The Fourth Line is one of the roads that is highest on the list of roads that need work," Smeltzer said Monday, noting there is a high volume of traffic, including school buses on the road.

An informal show of hands at the public meeting showed two-thirds favoured reconstruction and one-third did not, with some of those in opposition arguing that if the road condition was improved it would encourage more and faster traffic. Several people also suggested that if the road was better maintained it would eliminate the need for reconstruction.


There are many new students at the school this year in all age groups, which makes it more fun to try to remember everyone's names.


