Man dies in crash

Halton police are looking for witnesses to a two-vehicle accident early Monday morning in Milton that killed an Acton man.

Gerald Dick, 49, of 155 Churchill Road South was pronounced dead at the scene of the accident, which oc-

curred at 7:56 am at Tremaine Road and Steeles Avenue.

Police report that Dick's southbound mini-van and an east-bound pick-up truck collided in the intersection and Dick's vehicle left the road and ended up in a ditch. The pick-up truck left the road and travelled some distance through a field before coming to a stop.

Dick had to be extricated from the van by the Milton Fire Department. The driver of the pick-up, 29-year-old Sean James of Campbellville, had only minor injuries, which did not require hospital treatment.

Dick, a Provincial Bailiff with the Ministry of Correctional Services, was on his way to work at the Hamilton Jail when the accident occurred.

Dick is survived by his wife Colleen Wilson-Dick, his step-son Jeff, 30, sons Rory, 14, and Brendan, 11 and his mother Mrs. Mary Dick.

At press time funeral arrangements had not been finalized.



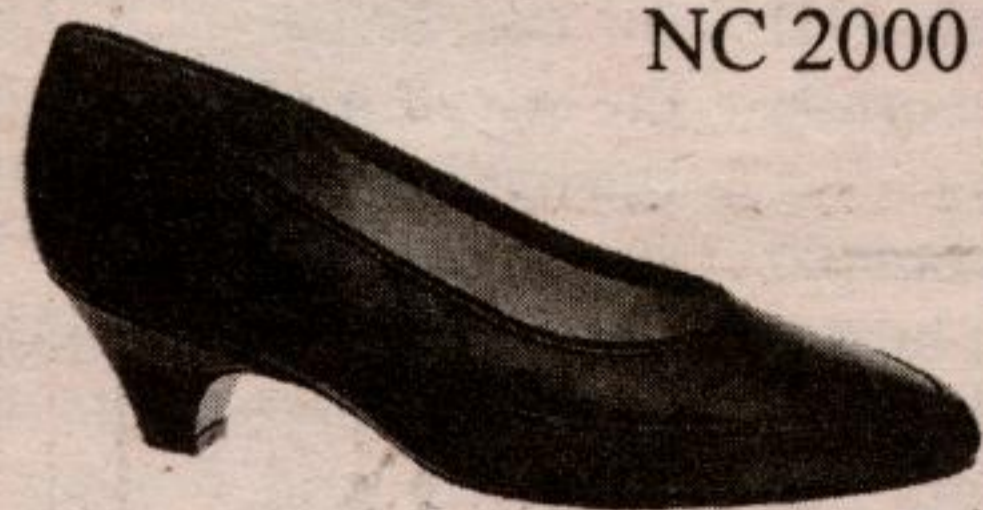
