Town hall could take on new life

This is one person who likes Heritage Acton's proposal to turn the old Town Hall on Willow Street into a community centre again.

The building, built in 1881 for just that purpose, is 115 years old but has undergone a transformation from the original red brick structure without losing its essential character. It has just never been finished.

When the fire hall was added onto the rear, the stage in the upstairs auditorium was cut in two and a cement block wall erected between the old and new facilities, retaining the stage arch. When Heritage Acton saved the building from demolition, the Town turned it over to them as administrators.

A large part of the old Town Hall has been restored but the auditorium upstairs has received only minimum restoration because it can't be used until there are enough fire safety exits. Downstairs, of course, the old hall, once the administrative centre of Acton, has been tastefully restored and is occupied by Acton Support Services and Information Centre (ASSIC).

Now that the fire department has gone to its new quarters on Churchill Road, the fire hall has been declared surplus by Halton Hills and has gone on the block for an asking price of \$160,000. Heritage Acton has requested that the Town turn the old fire hall over to them so it can be incorporated into the Town Hall.

Spokesman Dr. George Elliott told Town Council recently that Heritage Acton could incorporate the fire hall with the town hall by removing the cement block wall, which would enable them to restore the stage, a contingency allowed for when reconstruction for the fire hall took place. The upstairs could then be converted into a backstage area with dressing rooms while the downstairs, which housed the fire trucks, could be converted into rooms for rehearsals, meeting rooms or other uses.

Dr. Elliott foresaw the stage being used by local theatre and amateur groups who don't need something as professional as the John Elliott Theatre in Georgetown. The whole building, then, would be controlled and maintained by Heritage Acton as the old Town Hall now is.

Total cost to the Town? – donation of the building, which likely won't find a ready buyer with a suitable use anyway. In turn, Elliott says, the Town would acquire a recreational facility at no cost and an organization administering it, which has a track record for getting things done.


How can you argue with that? Anyone who remembers the entertainments which took place in the old Town Hall, the dances, the political meetings and countless other activities, will surely add their support to Heritage Acton's plan. It could help restore some of the vitality that made Acton such a special place to live and work. Over the years it has been sapped by political changes and loss of venues due to a number of reasons.

At some time or other in its 115 years of existence, the old Town Hall has been home to the town library, school classrooms, police offices, council chambers, jail cells (which still exist), fire department, and a variety of entertainments including minstrel shows, square dances, concerts, and even a pork exhibition. It was built as a community centre and used as one.

Besides that, it is just about the only tangible evidence we have of the town that once saw the Town Hall as the centre of Acton life.
