

## MSB school land not to be sold

It looks like the soccer fields at McKenzie-Smith Bennett Public School will not be sold by the cash-hungry Halton Board of Education.

Top Board staff didn't include the 7.4 acre parcel of land between MSB and Churchill Road on the list of

five surplus properties they suggest the Board should sell.

The Superintendent's Council recommends the sites - 60 to 80 total acres be sold with six existing schools to help reduce Board operating costs by \$24 million in the next three years. Closing the schools will save \$2 million a year through lower heating, lighting and maintenance costs.

Four Burlington schools could be closed at the end of this year with two in Oakville and one in Milton. Both Speyside and Wrigglesworth Schools, which the Board doesn't use, will be sold.

Although the sale of Glen Williams P.S. is no longer

being considered, the news isn't quite as positive for Limehouse which remains on a list of possible closures if trustees vote for a higher school utilization target.

No teaching positions will be lost by the moves but there will be some reductions in the number of principals, secretarial and custodial staff.

Acton-Esquesing Trustee Ethel Gardiner noted that the recommendation to not sell the MSB land included the words "at this time."

"They simply don't believe there's a market for that land at this time," Gardiner explained on Saturday.

"I'm just delighted that the consultant and administration took into account what communities were saying."

MSB school council chair Joanne Stevenson said they are "relieved" that the surplus land will not be sold.

"It's a relief, but since the recommendation also says

'not at this time' we know that this issue hasn't gone away," Stevenson said.

Town staff said sale of the MSB land would have impacted at least four or five of the playing fields and the remaining site could only accommodate the redevelopment of two or three intermediate-sized fields.

Town staff noted the Board made its plans in isolation, without assessing the broader impact on the community and suggested a group be set up to discuss the Board's plan and initiate on-going discussions with the Board.

Trustees were briefed on the proposed report on Monday and are expected to make final decisions on land sales and school closures in December. Nov. 18 to 21 has been set aside by the Board to hear public delegations and the Board travels to Acton on Tuesday, Nov. 19 for a meeting at Acton High.
