Eden Mills firm saves Arboretum school programs

A unique partnership between an Eden Mills-based company specializing in nature interpretation and the University of Guelph's Arboretum saved the popular and highly-praised educational programs for school children.

The company, NEST, will provide interpretive programs on a contract basis, so recent budget cuts at the Arboretum won't mean program cuts for the 4,000 Kindergarten to Grade 6 students from across south central Ontario that take part in programs at the Arboretum annually.

NEST owner Susan Northcut is a nature interpreter who relocated to Eden Mills to take care of a friend's home, but now wants to stay. She

said that interpretation is a form of teaching that links the student's past experience to the topic being taught, using hands-on activities.

"This type of teaching is very effective for introducing youth to nature and the outdoors because it usually excites the participants to continue their learning beyond what we present to them," Northcut said.

The school programs, most of them written by Northcut's partner Donna MacWilliams, follow the Ministry of Education and Training common curriculum. Northcut, who has worked at the Arboretum, has provided off-site programs at the Ontario Science Centre, conservation areas, museums and schools.
