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Prospect Park's future debated

"Informal and visionary" are

key concepts behind a public workshop next week that will ask the public what they would like to see happen in the future at Prospect Park.

With the relocation of the arena to Acton East the Town is now able to consider future changes to both the design and function of the park which is under-used.

Using a pictorial approach participants, including park users, neighbours and interested citizens, will take maps of the park and pictures of possible attractions and uses and then cut and paste to create the park of the future.

"What we want is people to imagine what could be," explained consultant Ann Lawlor on Saturday. "We're not going to be hindered by planning rules or procedures or by what exists on the site right now. We want people to think long-term about how spectacular Prospect Park and the surrounding Fairy Lake

could be."

After a review of the history of the park, including its role as a major public resource, current facilities and operational requirements for events such as the Fall Fair, participants will consider the merits of some proposals for the park, including the Acton Agricultural Society's plans

to construct a new building on the site of the existing arena, which is slated to be torn down next year.

"This is an opportunity to put a wide variety of ideas into the mix so that the perspective of the general public and other users of the park can be heard," Lawlor said, noting that questionnaires about the park's future have been distributed to park neighbours and are also available at the arena. A random telephone survey will also be done with the results tabulated in a report to Town Council in December.

The workshop is Wednesday, Nov. 13 from 7 to 9 pm in the cafeteria at Acton High.

Floats needed


