Acton boys waiting for Big Brothers

After waiting for four long years to be matched with a Big Brother, Acton's Tim Kirk, 11, took matters into his own hands.

At the last Big Brothers of Halton Christmas party, Kirk button-holed case worker Susan Smith.

"I just gothim (Big Brother Bill Vick) after Christmas because I complained to Susan about how long it was taking to find me a Big Brother," Tim explained last Saturday.

"It's good," Tim said of the subsequent matching with Vick of Acton.

to act like my dad," Tim said, adding that one of his Acton friends has been waiting five years for a Big Brother.

The sad fact that Acton boys face these long waits to be matched with a stable male prompted the Big Brothers of Halton to focus on raising the organization's profile in north Halton. The Association opened a satellite office at McKenzie-Smith Bennett school last year and is hosting an open house at the Bank of Montreal on Mill Street today (Wednesday) from 3 pm until 6 pm.

With three active Big and Little Brother matches in Acton and eight boys wait-"It's like another person ing for a Big Brother, case


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worker Smith said recruitment is a major job.

Big brothers must be at least 18 years old and complete an Association orientation program which includes police and character references. Once accepted into the program the Big Brother is shown two or three profiles of boys waiting to be matched and selects the best

"We tell the boy that we have a potential match and then introduce them," Smith said, adding that that's the "best part of the job."

The Association monitors the relationship's trial period and then continues to make sure all is well with the match.

Smith said that if there was one typical characteristic for a Big brother it would be the desire to be a positive role model and to guide a young boy who is, in Association terms, father-absent.

When Big Brother Bill Vick was growing up in a broken home, he wished that he had a Big Brother and told himself that he would help a young boy when he got the chance.

After Vick's wife died several years ago he decided that the time was right and was matched with Tim.

Asked what he gets from the relationship, Vick said that "helping a young fellow is enough for me."

Vick laughed that Tim has also introduced him to the teenage art of "malling" and that they spend time flying, working on Vick's airplane and attending Leafs, Jays and Raptor games.

"I see my relationship with Tim being long term - I'm investing in his future."

The bike was recovered.



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
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
