
In order to expand the Mill/ Main Street parkette the BIA had been trying to purchase the land and just recently closed the deal. The BIA now plans to improve the parkette at Acton's main corner.

Complaints from Acton residents ticketed for parking illegally on the east side of Acton Boulevard as they drop off their children at the YMCA Day Care and MSB School have ended since a garbage dumpster was moved from the front of the school, creating a small parking area.

Acton Councillor Rick Bonnette raised the issue of building a Kiss n' Ride area but Town staff recommended taking no action on the proposal that could have cost \$10,000.
