A new standard and asphalt pad are just the latest in a series of recent changes to the picturesque playground, the scene of countless baseball games on warm summer nights, tobogganing and ski parties on cold winter days, and an after school meeting spot for kids and parents all year round.

The latest change is the culmination of seven years of work by a group known as the Park Committee. The happy band includes childcare workers and stay-at-home parents who were looking for a place to occupy their charges, residents such as: Susan Allen, Heather Susie Nagel, Wisener, Cousins, Lee Annette Bantyghen, Kirsten Goodman, Amanda Goerzen and Joanne Smith. Ironically, their children have grown up and some of the group have moved on and yet the project continues, a sign of the dedication of the Park Committee to their community.


The project was planned in three phases. The first phase saw the addition of a teeter-totter and slide, aimed at the younger set. The second phase was a larger structure for older kids that was constructed last summer. The installation of the playhouse was a grand success due to the assistance of many volunteers, including staff and equipment generously provided by Eramosa Township. The third phase is the latest project; a basketball court for kids of all ages, to be installed the first of May.

The Park Committee's plans did not come at a small cost — an estimated \$20,000 was required to complete the three phases. After an inauspicious start, raising \$30 on a raffle for a gingerbread house, their fundraising quickly gained momentum. The group has operated a successful teahouse at the annual Eden Mills Writer's Festival




and has offered gourmet buffets and other private catering jobs. They were also very successful at tapping in to the generosity of local business and service organizations. Gifts included: \$3000 over three years from the Rockwood Optimists Club; \$500 from the Rockwood Lioness Club; \$2000 from

BFI; \$500 from Union Gas; \$500 from McNeil Consumer Products, as well as countless private gifts. They also received bequests in the amount of \$550 in memorium to local resident Lorna Tomlinson.

With the project close to an end, there is just one more bit of fundraising left to do.

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
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
