Farm Safety Association and Helen Broadfoot; Lawn Mower Safety manned by Mike Howard and Dave Orr of Elmira Farm Machinery; Electrical Safety manned by Dale Dingwall of Halton Hills Hydro; Fire Safety Demonstration performed by the Erin Volunteer Fire Department; and Constable Dale Gear of the OPP, Guelph Detachment, gave an overview of street safety, home alone, first on the scene of an accident and motorized safety.


