Halton 4-H Rabbit Club

The third meeting of the Halton 4-H Rabbit Club was held on May 18, 1999 at Ward Brownridge's. The roll call was "Name a food that rabbits like." Some popular answers were pellets, lettuce, sunflower seeds, rolled oats, hay and apples, but have you ever heard of a rabbit that likes bananas?

Leader Marilyn Gooding discussed a rabbit's digestive system, comparing it to cows and humans. Rabbits are herbivores, which means they only eat plants and they only have one stomach for digesting food, unlike cows that have 4 stomachs.

We went outside to weigh our rabbits. Ward showed us two ways of weighing our rabbits: 1) using a platform scale, weigh the cage empty; weigh the rabbit in the cage and then subtract the weight of the empty cage to get the weight of your rabbit, or 2) using a hanging scale, hang the cage from the scale. The member's rabbits weighed between 1 1/2 - 12 lbs.

We then judged a class of 2-year-old New Zealand white does, Ward showed us the qualities you should look for in a rabbit using Trix to demonstrate. After we had placed the class, Naomi Lutes gave a great set of reasons for her placing. Ward then gave the official placing and reasons. We all did very well!

We ended the meeting with a true & false Rabbit Review from our manuals, while we enjoyed a cold pop and cookies.
