

Estate winery a first for Halton Hills

With its 150 acres of fruit and vegetables, picnic area and playground, Andrews Scenic Acres has become one of southern Ontario's favourite pickyour-own-operations. Now, with the addition of its Scotch Block Country Winery, Halton Hill's first microwinery, it's about to become an even more popular tourist destination.

Set in the heart of what has been recently termed Escarpment Country, the winery will soon offer premium wines made from strawberries, raspberries, cherries, currants, blueberries, apples, peaches and pears and some, such as apple-raspberry, will be blended. "This newest venture brings together the very best fruit we have to offer and the experience of a winemaker who has been in the business 20 years," says Bert Andrews, president and founder of the family-run operation.

The new winery was built by a team of Mennonites headed by 80-year-old Noah Martin. Andrews, impressed by the standards and speed of their craftsmanship on previous projects at the farm, says it was just a natural to invite Martin and his men back for the new undertaking.

With its interior walls and ceiling of tongue and groove pine, a tasting bar in the retail section and picture window viewing to the manufacturing process, the winery is an interesting blend of old and new. The retail section's antique farm equipment contrasts with state of the art fermenting tanks in the processing area. Visitors to the winery will have direct access to the farm market and free educational tours will be offered seven days a week.

Andrews Scenic Acres is situated just west of Trafalgar Rd. or just east of old Hwy. 25 on 10 Sideroad (Ashgrove Rd.). The popular area farm holds a number of special events each year. For more information concerning upcoming events and Scotch Block Winery call (905) 878-5807.

Also new to the guide is a postage-paid comment card. "As a learning organization, we are committed to listening to

our residents and businesses to ensure that we are offering the best possible resources," added Marshall. "This comment card will allow us to evaluate the guide and the sections within so that it meets the needs of Halton citizens."
