

Art in the Afternoon

Halton Hills is a centre for creative endeavour, and is fortunate to be surrounded by artists' studios – including the Williams Mill collective – musicians and performers of repute, theatrical and artisans groups, and a theatre and gallery.

"Art in the Afternoon" is an outdoor celebration of these people and their work. Never does downtown Georgetown's Main Street look more striking than during a summer festival, when "Art in the Afternoon" beautifies the street. Artists compete for a two week show in the Cultural Centre Gallery based on viewers choice. Included this year are watercolours, acrylics, glass and pottery.
