Cream of the Crop

Kerri Alexander wins '99 Chapman Scholarship

She's been an ambassador, a youth leader, actively involved in her community, and now Kerri Alexander of Norval is the 1999 winner of the Dr. Ethel Chapman Scholarship.

Dr. Ethel Chapman grew up on a Halton County Farm near Campbellville. When she was very young she wrote for various church papers and for the Toronto Globe. She became interested in agricultural extension work when she saw an itinerant home economist working with rural women. Her long career of creative service allowed her to combine her talents as a writer with her dedication to rural extension work. Educated at the Macdonald Institute in Guelph, Dr. Chapman joined the field staff of the Women's Institutes Branch of the Home Economics Service of the Ontario Department Agriculture.

Dr. Chapman's career alternated between journalism and extension work. For several years she was with the Maclean Publishing company, working on the Farmer's Magazine and on Macleans. She was Assistant Superintendent of the Women's Institutes Branch of the Ontario Department of Agriculture for five years and then became the editor of the Farmer's magazine. She later was with the Home **Economics Extension Service and** she became the editor of the Home & Country, the magazine for the Federated Women's Institutes of Ontario.

friend to women's institute members. Her guidance, thoughtfulness and charm will long be remembered by the membership. Asked shortly before her death in 1976 what in her rich and accomplished life had she prized the most, she answered without hesitation, "The many friends I have made."

Dr. Chapman was the author of three novels God's Green Country, The Homesteaders and With Flame of Freedom - as well as a number of serials, short stories and articles for Sunday School papers and magazines.

From a Roadside Window is a collection of 81 stories. These sketches first appeared in a regular column in the Farmer's Advocate and they might never have found their way into a book if the Women's Institutes of Ontario had not felt a concern to save them for further reading. Being a Halton native, the Halton District Women's Institute felt Dr. Chapman deserved special recognition in Women's Institute cir-

In 1970 the Halton District Women's Institute honoured her in a permanent way by establishing the scholarship.

The initial award was presented to Cathy Lasby in 1971, the 70th anniversary of the Halton District W.I. Dr. Chapman attended District Day and personally presented Cathy with the first scholarship. Each year the Halton District W.I. presents the \$300 scholarship to a current 4-H Dr. Chapman was a true member, a graduate of secondary

school who has completed six or more lifestyle 4-H projects, or a past member who has completed 12 4-H projects and is furthering his or her post secondary education and is a resident of Halton or is a 4-H member in Halton.

Kerri Alexander has completed 21 4-H projects, was a youth leader in 1997 for the Power of Produce, attended leadership camps, and has been actively involved in her community and school. Extra curricular activities at school included band, badminton, volleyball, peer mentor programme, peer assistant learning programme and the

Miss Alexander was selected Fair Ambassador for the Georgetown Agricultural Society in 1997, is a provincial director for Halton Junior Farmers, and has served her church on the worship and music committee and played piano for Sunday School.

Kerri completed her O.A.C. at Georgetown District High School with a high academic standing and is currently attending the University of Guelph in the degree programme of Agricultural Business.

Halton District President Marion McPhail sends congratulations to Kerri and encourages more 4-H members to apply for this scholarship and the Halton W.I. Bursary as well.

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Milton authors


