

# Glenda's Kitchen Kapers



Well it appears we all survived the Y2K bug. As for the other bugs around, some of us weren't so lucky. A month later I am starting to feel like living again. Hopefully you will miss the flu, colds and pneumonia that so many have had. I wanted to share one of my favourite winter meals. I often make this meat loaf when my kids come for an after work meal but there are never any leftovers for Bert when I serve it.

### SOUPERIOR MEAT LOAF

1 envelope Lipton Onion or Beef flavour Mushroom Soup Mix

2 pounds of ground beef

1 1/2 cups of soft bread crumbs

2 eggs

3/4 cup water

1/3 cup ketchup

Preheat oven to 350. In large bowl, combine all ingredients. In large shallow baking pan, shape into a loaf. Before baking make a slit in center of loaf and add the sauce.

#### **Meatloaf Sauce**

3 tablespoons brown sugar

1/4 cup ketchup

1/4 teaspoon nutmeg 1 level teaspoon dry mustard

Bake for 1 hour or until done. Makes 6-8 servings.

I try to use the oven for the whole meal when I make this meat loaf. I do baked potatoes & acorn squash or I sometimes do a mixed baked veggie casserole. I cut up potatoes, carrots, yam, onions and parsnips, add a couple tablespoons of Catalina dressing (Italian is good too but we prefer the Catalina), stir and add enough water to keep the veggies from sticking. It cooks in the same time as the meat loaf.

Here is a quick supper I often make for the girls on their Sparks & Brownies night. Served with Grandma's warm tea biscuits or fresh buns, they eat their fill.

#### KRAFT DINNER SUPPER DISH

Cook Kraft dinner as directed. Brown 1 pound lean ground beef and one onion. Add one tin of tomato soup (no water). Add this to the prepared Kraft dinner. Stir and serve. Of course ketchup is a must for the girls, but I prefer chili sauce.



## Sally Baxter's Kinrik

Sally Baxter has always had an affinity for animals.

Her home is a sanctuary for the wounded animals that people bring to her, not knowing where else to go. She has nursed, fostered and then released back into the wild squirrels, raccoons, foxes, rabbits, birds and even once, an opossum. Now, with the establishment of Kinrik, the Escarpment Cat Adoption Sanctuary, Sally is able to offer sanctuary to cats and kittens needing a home.

Sally, whose five acre farm backs onto a conservation area, has converted a two story garage to house Kinrik. Located south of Campbellville, Kinrik is owned and operated solely by Sally but will work closely with local veterinarians. Although kittens will be available for adoption at ten weeks of age, cats will have a home at Kinrik for as long as they need before adoption. No cat will be put down because it hasn't been adopted within a certain time frame. The cats will live in as natural as surrounding as possible and be raised to be family friendly. Only those cats awaiting vet testing for feline leukemia and Aids will remain in pens until receiving a clean bill of health and boosters.

Although Kinrik, is operated solely by Sally, volunteers will always be welcome as the workload may become heavy at times. Each cat will have it's own food and water bowls as well as it's own litter box for health reasons. Donations of basic supplies such as litter boxes, paper towels, old

blankets, pet baskets, carriers, cat toys or scratching posts would be gratefully accepted by Sally. For those wishing to make financial donations, Sally has set up a forensic account for Kinrik's expenses and stresses that all money raised will go directly for the cat's needs and not to cover facility expenses.

All of the cats will be available for adoption and Sally is hopeful that people will come and spend some time before deciding which one to take home. She will arrange flexible times ad encourages adopters to take as long as they need to choose the cat that will best fit into their home. There will be an adoption fee, as she ensures that all cats have received their vaccinations and adoptive families will be strongly urged to spay or neuter their new

Although a lot of the work has been done, Kinrik doesn't officially open until spring.

Sally doesn't begrudge the time, hard work or money that gone into making the Escarpment Cat Adoption Sanctuary a reality and says "this is who I am, this is what I'm about. If I can make a difference, I want to. It's not about profit, but about educating people to do the right thing. If we can influence that at all, that's a good thing.

"I want the kittens to have a good start. I love them all."

Lorraine Keech, owner of Milton's Recycled Reading and long time animal advocate encourages anyone able to, to donate their time pet supplies or make a financial donation if possible to Kinrik.
