GOODFELLOWS SIGNS – Council approved a variance to the sign By-law permitting temporary directional signage until a permanent directional signage program is developed for the area. This is intended to eliminate trucks becoming lost in the Village.

FLAMBOROUGH – Flamborough Council has indicated an interest in separating into three sections under the Hamilton-Wentworth restructuring mandated by the Province. One section proposes to join with Burlington & Milton. Council continues to work with the Region to review the proposal and issues, with particular attention to the implications on service levels, assumption of debt, delineation of boundaries and the time frame involved. Currently the submission deadline is March 17th.


BIG PIPE – A quick update on Milton urban development. There will be a number of road closures – Henderson Road (March & April) Burnhamthorpe Road & Lower Baseline Road (April), Thompson Road (August) for several days at a time, beginning in March. Notices and detours will be posted. First flush set for September 29th, 2000.

EC DRURY LANDS – Although this parcel of land is in urban Milton, adjacent to the E.C. Drury School for the Deaf, there has been considerable interest shown in Nassagaweya regarding this proposed development. Milton Council, in a 5–4 decision, denied the application to permit the development of 189 bungalow condominium units. An appeal has been filed with the OMB by the developer, H. D. Investments and Leisureworld.

TRANSIT – Subject to Operating Budget consideration, Council approved a three year proposal for Transit Service by Laidlaw Transportation Services which maintains peak hour service, introduces a Demand Responsive Transit service, provides school service, and expands service to the GO station.

PUBLIC MEETING – All residents are encouraged to attend the Public Meeting hosted by the Nassagaweya Community Consultation Committee (NCCC) on March 8th to discuss the plans to reconstruct Guelph Line between 10 & 15 Sideroads and work under consideration for 15 Sideroad. Informal discussion at 7 p.m., followed by a presentation by the Region at 7:30 p.m.
