Until June 11, Touch with your Eyes is a unique showcase for two artists of the Glen Williams Mill.

Peter Perko, a digital image creator, has maintained a successful career in graphic design for over 20 years, bringing unique, high-level visual solutions to clients in a wide range of organizations. He has worked in book publishing, advertising/communications and corporate design, children's book illustrations and more. Since 1996 he has operated an independent design business under the name Eye Cue Designs.

Also at the Williams Mill is Studio Mélange, home of Bonnie Glass. She has created and produced original, wearable art fulltime for the past six years, and had gained a loyal following for the unmistakable style and quality of her coats and other clothing. Rave reviews follow each of her sold-out fashion shows.

For both Peter and Bonnie, the show is a chance to stretch beyond their day-to-day creativity and explore uncharted territory. It's Peter's first major show of fine art and gives Bonnie a unique opportunity to experiment with unencumbered ideas.

The two artists have put together an exhibition loosely based on the idea of exploring texture. Their divergent media find common ground in the real or perceived sensation of touch, and expand to include colour and concepts that engage the viewer in ways never before attempted by these artists.
