



## The Town of Milton Council Recap

SPECIAL DAYS: October 8 – 14, Fire Prevention Week. October 14, Fire Service Recognition Day. October 13 & 14, Army Cadet Corps Tag Days. October 15 – 21, Home Builders' Week.

AWARD! GRAND Congratulations to the Grand River Conservation Authority on winning the prestigious 2000 Theiss International Environmental Services Riverprize Award! The \$100,000 award was announced in before Australia just Olympics!

HYDRO: Council is proceeding with establishing Milton Hydro Holding Inc. and Milton Hydro Distribution Inc. to meet the Provincial mandate. The Transfer Bylaw will take place on October 1, 2000. Council will appoint seven officers, plus the Mayor as representative of Council, to the Inaugural Board of Directors. These appointments will soon be announced

**GUELPH LINE LANDSCAPE** OPEN HOUSE: An Open House was held at Brookville Hall on August 31st to review the final landscape plan for the Guelph Line reconstruction. This work will proceed next spring, pending budget by Regional Council. The \$453,000 plan is a significant increase over the original proposal. Approximately 350 trees were removed, and will be replaced by 483 trees and nearly 1400 shrubs. The 15 Sideroad intersection will include traffic signals, crossbanding, interlocking stone, and Side Boulevard. Clover Farms is completing the new look for the Haltonville Hamlet with their own renovations to the gas bar and store, using a country heritage theme.

TWISS & STEELES RECONSTRUCTION: The long requested reconstruction of this intersection will proceed this year. Design is in the final stages, with the contract to be awarded the first week of October. The cost of reconstruction is just over \$600,000.

AGGREGATE FEES: Council received a cheque for \$307,000 as the Town's share of license fees collected from aggregate producers in 1999. The cheque was delivered by the Ontario Aggregate Resources Corporation, accompanied by Sarah Lowe of Dufferin Aggregates and Norm Flemington of Sherman Sand & Gravel.

Council reviewed its
Development Charge Bylaw,
returning to a 100 per cent
exemption on bona fide agricultural operations. Exemptions will
be tied to the Provincial assessment on the property, and will

ment on the property, and will include an agreement that charges will be reinstated if the structure changes use within three years. This policy is in line with the Region and neighbouring municipalities.

LOWER BASE LINE: The speed limit on Lower Baseline between Trafalgar Road and Ninth Line will be reduced to 60km on an interim basis, and will be reviewed after completion of Highway 407. The No Truck designation continues on this road.

SLOTS DOLLARS: Council elected to designate the Community Services Advisory

Committee (CSAC) as the agency to distribute the \$500,000 Community Fund from the Town's portion of Mohawk Slots revenue. This committee of Council is currently developing the criteria and guidelines for applications. Grants will be considered beginning next year.

SAFETY AWARDS: Mowbray of the Milton Road Safety Committee was honoured with an Award of Merit from the Halton Region Safety Council for her leadership in promoting a safer community. Jan was Chair Milton's Road Safety Challenge, an exciting week of activities, as well as participating in Road Watch, Rural Cleanup, Neighbourhood Watch, and serving as secretary for the NCCC. The evening also included the of presentation Lifesaving Awards to Milton residents Donna Bailie, Sheena Butler, and Tony Ferrante for heroic actions.


