




Halton resident Lorna Wilson attends Alberta 4-H Conference

One of the joys of being a volunteer is when you're asked to attend a conference to learn more about your organization and get new ideas to keep it viable.

I recently flew to Alberta to experience 4-H western style and find out why the program is so popular and successful.

For the first time this year, Alberta has surpassed Ontario for the highest number of 4-H members but I believe that we will regain that title as our new program becomes well known. We have a lot of similarities with Alberta in that both provinces face cancellations of opportunities due to decline in membership. In Alberta, as well as Ontario, there is a membership fee for being part of 4-H, theirs set at least twice as high per year, as our annual \$15.00. The Province still operates a good portion of the program, compared to Ontario's total independence from government hands on work.

Alberta has an ambassador program which rewards the senior members and is quite an honour to achieve. These Ambassadors serve as junior leaders, camp leaders and youth spokesmen for the 4-H program. As with all of their opportunities, qualified applicants must submit an application and essay, as well as take courses in first aid to become eligible for the Ambassador title. I cannot say enough about 4-H opportunities. 4-H members and volunteers who participate in these opportunities always return refreshed, energized and full of new ideas and knowledge. If you are a 4-H member or volunteer, do not hesitate to apply for all those opportunities you qualify for.

Fundraising was an important topic at the Alberta Conference. Most of their funds are raised through volunteer operated casinos and bingos. In fact, all 4-H parents are given a committee to be part of at the first 4-H meeting of the year. I gained insight to the similarities of the fundraising woes we all feel, and came away with some dynamic new ideas.

A topic that we don't like to deal with, is youth at risk. This was covered very well by a probation officer from Red Deer who spoke on how to identify, and deal with, those particular youth. This session reinforced the importance of volunteer screening and workshops.

The conference was not all work, however, as I learned to two-step (with a genuine Alberta Cowboy) and play Spoons (a card game that can be very dangerous). Networking and idea sharing were also an important aspect. Albertans love to have fun and are VERY hospitable. The most memorable session, by far, was the keynote speaker's topic of "The 4 C's of Good Leadership." In this, the International Year of the Volunteer, he was very timely with his message. The satisfaction that I get from volunteering cannot be measured in dollars and cents, only pride in seeing 4-H'ers successful and confident. This Conference, in Alberta, renewed my commitment and recharged my volunteer battery.
