### Town of Milton hopeful of winning Communities in Bloom Contest

There's nothing left to do but wait. As of September 15, the Town of Milton will finally know its ranking in this year's Communities in Bloom contest for provincial communities (population 20,001 to 50,000).

Milton is in competition with three other communities - Owen Sound, Tecumseh and the neighbouring community of Halton Hills.

Milton's judging took place from August 15 to August 17 but the preparations for the event have been ongoing since last year through the participation of numerous volunteers.

The judges, Ted Blowes of

Stratford and Martin Quinn of Kincardine, were treated to many of Milton's precious gems including the Mill Millennium Pond Gazebo, the Waldie Blacksmith Shop, Bronte Street Pioneer Cemetery, Percy Merry School Millennium everything Gardens, and Campbellville has to offer.

Despite the deceiving title of the program - Communities in Bloom - its focus is on a wide variety of community components.

"There are eight categories, it's not just about blooms," Mr. Quinn said. "Although a lot of people do think that."

Each competitor is evaluated for their efforts on improving and addressing tidiness, the environment, community involvement, heritage, urban forestry, landscaped areas, floral arrangements and turf areas. Each of the eight components are then broken down further to incorporate the efforts expended by the municipality and its inhabitants such as the commercial businesses.

"We want to know what the factories are doing. How much litter is around, etcetera," Mr. Quinn

Though Mr. Blowes has been involved in the Communities in Bloom judging for a number of years, Mr. Quinn was a judge for the first time this year. He said not only does judging allow him the opportunity to compare his own town to others, it lets him see the way communities can really come together for a single cause.

"It's amazing when you start this project in the community. You find out all these different people are doing all this work in the community."

> As both judges acknowledged, the program is well known for its ability to not only bring a community together for a common cause, but also to bring about a great sense of pride.

Pride was exemplified by two prominent

Milton volunteers during an intimate meeting with judges. Jean Woods represented the rural community Her focus on the rural areas of Milton and her role in the yearly Nassagaweya clean up days are just the tip of the iceberg.

Len Lee also presented a brief speech about the pride of demonstrated Miltonians as through community service clubs.

The general theme that seems to arise in every discussion about success in the Communities in Bloom program is cooperation.

"You really do need a cooperative effort," Mr. Blowes said. "You have to have leadership from the top - it really makes a difference."

After 36 years, Milton's Mayor Gord Krantz has proven he is able to fill the role and model the type of leadership needed in succeeding not only in the program but as a town in general.

"I try to involve myself as much as I can," Mayor Krantz said.

He is hopeful that his involvement in community events, especially those directed to youths will ensure Miltonians success in the Communities in Bloom program and a wonderful future in general.

"The young people are the leaders of tomorrow," Mayor Krantz said. "I think we're planting those seeds right now that they need to carry on."






