


## Grasshopper Tournament



Following a nutritious dinner, the crowd enjoyed a campfire atmosphere around the stage once again.


The graduates of the C.Y.O. grade eight leadership camp provided ed drama and music.



Roger Moore of Birchmoor Woodworking

When Roger Moore decided to leave Stewartown School at the end of grade eight to work at Peel Truck and Trailer, he never thought he'd end up back at school studying a new way to make a living.

Diagnosed with diabetes as a child, Mr. Moore began having problems with his sight and in 1987, at the age of 22, he lost sight in both eyes. Unable to continue working at Peel Truck and Trailer and unsure of what he wanted to do next, Mr. Moore called Dave Lawrence, the grade seven/eight teacher who had been sorry to see his former student leave school so young.

"I called him at home, told him what had happened and he got me into the Adult Wood-Working Shop at Georgetown High School. It was actually a fluke. I wanted to take Small Engines but when that class wasn't available, Dave got me into Woodworking."

Fourteen years later, Mr. Moore has his grade 12 diploma and a thriving business.

Owner and operator of BirchMoor Woodworking, named after the family's Speyside Farm BirchMoor Acres, Mr. Moore builds custom furniture by hand. He builds by specification to the customers needs, whether they

desire beds, tables, hutches, entertainment centres or more, and uses a wide variety of woods which include pine, maple, oak, and wal-

"I try to give a good value," says Mr. Moore. "My stuff is well made and its all custom furniture at a wholesale cost."

Mr. Moore hasn't let the loss of his sight keep him from creating beautiful and unique furniture.

"It was a little intimidating at first in the workshop at the school," he admits. "But you have to remember that the machines are the boss. You have to have respect for them and you have to be careful and take your time."

Now, however, the work he does is second nature to him.

"I forget that I can't see, I'm so use to it," says Mr. Moore. "You probably can't see half of the things I can feel in the wood."

All of the work done by Birchmoor Woodworking is custom built by commission by Roger Moore.

"I sell custom made at wholesale prices," says Mr. Moore. "And I always give a good value."

We then went outside to see their haylage pit silo. Many of the members had never seen one before. We then went into the barn and judged a class of 3-year-old Holstein cows.
