





Stop break-ins: don't give thieves any breaks!



Burglar-proof your home with these simple tips:

Key lock windows are a good investment and should be considered if you are now in the process of renovating or building your house.

2. Marking your belongings has been proven effective. Your police department can provide you with the necessary tool, free of charge, and instruct you on its use. You will also be handed outside display decals stating that your property has been marked. Their deterrent value is excellent: thieves stay away from marked pieces since "fences" will not handle them.

3. Your jewelry is a favourite target of burglars: easy to carry, often unidentifiable, it can easily be resold. Like most people, you probably store yours in a jewelry box or one of your dresser drawers. It's a good idea to leave enough costume jewelry in these places to satisfy thieves that they have found what they're looking for. Your good jewelry, on the other hand, can be hidden in an out-of-the-way place. A little imagination will help you determine a place both unlikely yet within easy reach.

4. A warning buzzer on the fence gate can be linked to the house, letting you know whenever someone is entering your property.
