Keeping the home fires burning

Glenda's Kitchen Kapers

If you are like me you probably have certain recipes that you tend to make at certain times of the year. These two cake recipes are certainly two of my fall recipes. They both keep well but don't often get the chance to keep too long. As well, they both freeze well.

CRANBERRY SPICE CAKE

1/2 cup butter or margarine

1 cup sugar

1 egg

1 cup raisins

1/2 cup chopped walnuts or pecans

1 3/4 cup all purpose flour

1 tsp baking powder

1 tsp baking soda

1 tsp cinnamon 1/2 tsp ground cloves

1/4 tsp salt

1 can (14 oz/398 ml) Ocean Spray jellied cranberry sauce (mashed)

Cream butter. Beat in sugar and egg. Stir in raisins and nuts. Combine dry ingredients and add to creamed mixture. Stir in cranberry sauce. Pour into greased tube or bunt pan. Bake at 350 for one hour. Makes one cake. Cake is wonderful topped with vanilla custard sauce. For a simple topping sprinkle with icing sugar. N.B. Very moist and keeps well in fridge.

When there's work to be done, turn up your sleeves - not your nose.

PUMPKIN CAKE

2 cups sifted all purpose flour

2 tsp baking powder

1 tsp soda

1/2 tsp salt

1 1/2 tsp cinnamon

1/2 tsp ground cloves

1/4 tsp allspice

1/4 tsp ginger

1 cup All Bran or Bran Bud cereal or 1 1/2 cups Bran Flakes

1 - 6 oz package semi-sweet chocolate chips

1 cup raisins

1 cup chopped pecans

2 cup sugar

4 eggs

1 - 1lb can (4 cups) canned pumpkin

1 cup vegetable oil

Sift together flour, baking powder, soda, salt, spices and sugar. Let stand. In a large mixing bowl beat eggs until foamy. Add pumpkin, oil and bran. Mix well. Add sifted dry ingredients, mixing only until combined. Stir in chocolate chips and pecans. Spread evenly in ungreased 10x4 inch tube pan. Bake in 350 degree oven about one hour and ten minutes or until tester near centre comes out clean. Cool completely before removing from pan. Drizzle with confectioners sugar glaze if desired.

Hamper program - the joy of giving

Christmas is fast approaching and in the flurry of buying the perfect toys for the kids, and figuring out just what to get cranky Aunt Sarah this year, it's easy to forget that for some mothers, even decisions like this are unattainable.

Through the Holiday Hamper Program, women and their dependent children who have used the services of Halton Women's Place in the past year will receive a hamper containing food and new gifts to help them with their first holiday season on their own.

"Christmas can be a traumatic time of the year for anyone because of the societal pressures," explains Sue Ellen Slater of Halton Women's Place. "For women in crisis, it can be even more traumatic. We make a commitment to the

women we serve to assist them with their holidays."

Halton Women's Place needs individuals, community groups and local businesses to sponsor the 115 families. Sponsors will anonymously adopt a family and receive a copy of their "Wish List", a list of items needed by the mother and her children. Sponsors are asked to provide gifts worth about \$100 per child and mother and to include food vouchers, gift wrap and tape so the mother can wrap the surprises to leave under the tree Christmas morning.

"We often run short of gifts for moms and teens," says Ms. Ellen. "Gift certificates for movies or music stores are great. Gift certificates are really invaluable. One mom last year was able to use gift certificates to take her kids to the movies, something they see other families doing but which they just couldn't afford to do otherwise."

If you can't make the financial commitment of a hamper, you can still help out. Donations are needed of for women and children who will spend the holiday season in the shelter. Any help is appreciated and you can find out more by calling 905-332-1200, ext 221.

"Many women say that if it wasn't for this program, they wouldn't have Christmas," explains Ms. Ellen.

1. Fan and other openings larger than 600 cm² should be secured with sturdy locking devices.
