

### As Unique As A Snowflake

How do you describe snow to a child who has never felt it squeak beneath her feet or melt on her tongue?

"To know snow / you must hold it in your hand / feel it melt to pearls of water / until it is gone..."

The response, written by author Sheree Fitch to a fictional child, is part of a poetic letter of most amazing quality, rich with lyrics that roll off the tongue, in a feast of sound. Through asking and telling, two penpals - one Canadian and one Ghanaian - reach halfway around the world

other with the beauty of words and images.

After hearing the words "no two snowflakes are alike" in grade two, Ms. Fitch

was hooked on images of differences of people spread across the wide world, of traditions, lifestyles and of course, snowflakes. When visiting Belize as an adult, she shared stories and poetry with children and their teachers. One boy asked her to tell him what snow was like, and although she tried, it was too difficult to describe when you had never experienced it before.

Obviously, when the author arrived home and rediscovered snow, the words that softly tumbled from her pen truly captured the essence of those remarkable flakes. The resulting book, No Two Snowflakes, has part of its proceeds going toward UNICEF and the group's ongoing work. At the end of the book are several from UNICEF suggestions teacher-volunteer Canada's Dinny Biggs, experiments that celebrate the senses, and undoubtedly children will enjoy

Eden Mills illustrator Janet Wilson's pastel work reveals wintry wonderlands of snow. The settings glide through all types of whiteness, from crisp and crusty, to spraying or snowball-making. She has produced crystalline images of blizzards, sledding days, crunching through crusts in lunar-like landscapes, and traipsing home in an indigo evening after an afternoon of play. One might expect that a book of snow would be somewhat tedious snow's just white, after all - but Ms. Wilson has created vibrant pages portraying laughing chil-


dren as they romp in bold snowsuits. The warm glow of home lights peeking like beacons through trees or behind a blizzardy night, or sun and

moon shadows played against a snowy backdrop are enchanting.

Ms. Fitch has won many awards for her 13 books of poetry for children, including a Mr. Christie's Book Award and a Vicky Metcalf Award. She is a renowned poet and performer, and in recent years has been a visiting author to Belize, Mexico, Bhutan, Kenya, Uganda and Tanzania. Ms. Wilson is a multi-award-winning illustrator, known for her graceful work in books such as In Flanders Fields, Selina and the Bear Paw Quilt, and Anna's Goat.

She was already famous for her book, Anne of Green Gables, published 18 years earlier. During her time in Norval, she published five novels and wrote two-and-a-half of her 10 journals from her writing room in the Presbyterian Manse overlooking Russell's hill of pines. Many of the day's festivities are designed to honour Ms. Montgomery.
