But painting is not her only love. Many facets of the creative world capture her imagination, and Ms. Newlove is ready to embrace whatever inspiration she receives.

Although she does work in watercolour and acrylic, paintings are generally oil on canvas. Some bear gold leaf embellishments and are stunningly framed. Throughout the house of her mother Rose Anna Newlove where the studio is located are other scattered works.

An antique cabbage shredder holds a "dictionary page" and its tiny, precise Medieval-style illustrations, tacked up inside with a funky handmade cast nail. Wire sculptures abound, and in a display case a couple of tiny paintings highlight multi-hued glass beads. An old medicine cabinet frames another illustration series on a dictionary page, the sides of the box carefully engraved with their own depictions. Overall, the work is a combination of fantasy and whimsy - farflung flights of imagination.

"I didn't even know that Tina had any talent for art," stated Rose Anne Newlove, "until after she was 11. She didn't bring any art home from school because the other kids always wanted her work. One time she drew this really amazing seahorse, and then a lion. Eventually Tina won prizes at the Georgetown Fall Fair - ribbons and money - and entered the other fairs in Acton and Milton. When she'd won continuously in those, we went to artist Doreen Fitzgibbons, who said she had a wonderful talent."

Thereafter, Ms. Newlove took both private and group lessons, and became curator of the Grade 13 Art Show in Milton before attending university.

"Mac (McMaster University) turned out to be a great program for me. They offered a small array of courses, like painting and printmaking... It was a good atmosphere."

After graduation, Ms. Newlove attempted to enter shows here and there.

Some of Ms. Newlove's related artistic experience has occurred through her relationship with the band Tribe of One, from Winnipeg.

"We focus as a group. The arts can be freedom and release - we find it incredibly energizing our- www.2souls.ca.
