



#### Guelph Line unsafe; changes planned

Guelph Line has been under close watch.

The Region of Halton has completed several road studies to assess the conditions of existing roads and structures. One of the recent studies recommends Guelph Line, from Cameron Drive to 20 Side Road, be completely reconstructed to address drainage deficiencies and structural inadequacies.

This study also indicates there is an immediate need for this reconstruction. The Region of Halton, in response to this study, has initiated an Environmental Assessment Study for this section of the Guelph Line and a meeting to provide public input was held December 4, 2001, at Brookville Hall.

"This project has been earmarked as a deficient road for quite some time," explained Regional Councillor Barry Lee.

"This is being done to bring the road up to a level to handle the volume that's on it. This road's being

reconstructed to bring it up to safety standards. It's dangerous the way it is."

The road study, done by the Region, highlights several areas of concern for this section of Guelph Line. It describes the existing pavement structure as deficient with alligator cracking, asphalt bleeding and general deterioration as well as substandard drainage. There is limited visibility at a number of driveways, resulting in poor driving conditions when vehicles enter or exit the roadway at these locations.

The study also shows that travel speeds are an issue (as vehicles travel at higher than the posted speeds) and illustrated concerns about the proximity of the school bus loading zones at Brookville Public School to the traffic on Guelph Line.

As well, the study indicates with the growth in residential areas, the lack of sidewalks to accommodate pedestrians wishing to travel to and from the Brookville Market, Brookville Public School,

Brookville Park, or Community Centre will become a larger issue.

Brookville residents present at the meeting were given the opportunity to voice their concerns. One concern that was re-iterated continually, was the current traffic speeds and volume.

"I've seen an increase in highway speed with people from Rockwood travelling through at excess speeds," stated Churchill Estates resident Mr. Rutledge. "The abuse of speed limits is intolerable."

Mr. Jim Horton, of iTRANS Consulting, who was leading the presentation on behalf of the Region, assured those gathered that "we will be looking at specific measures to control speed in the next step of the process. We'll be looking at what we can do about the speed issues, about defining the community, deal with school bus safety and noise issues."



#### A perfect Christmas Gift




