Construction begins on Barrier-Free Lift Project

Renovation work began at the Eden Mills Community
Centre during the first week of March with a ground breaking ceremony.

The hall, a cultural and recreational hub of Eden Mills that dates back to 1892, needs to be fully accessible to all and a newly installed lift will serve all four levels.

Niagara Elevators Inc. is supplier of the lift; project architect is L. Alan Grinham Architect Inc. of Guelph, and the contract has been awarded to Delvin Construction,

also of Guelph.

The accessibility project began in 1997 by volunteers who logged countless hours for research, fundraising and much more.

The Trillium Foundation, an agency of the Ontario Ministry of Tourism, Culture and Recreation, has granted \$71,200, and the Township of Guelph/Eramosa has given \$27,000 toward the estimated project cost of \$160,000. The next phase of fundraising will be to collect pledges and donations of \$40,000.

The Community Club has

applied for status as a registered charity under the Income Tax Act to allow issuing of income tax receipts for donations.

In the meantime, Guelph/Eramosa Township Council is agreeing to issue receipts using the Township's tax number.

The first phase of construction involves volunteers breaking concrete in the hall and installation of new drains to serve the new wheel-chair accessible washroom.

The project is expected to be complete for the summer.

Introductory hikes of the Bruce Trail, led by volunteer hike leaders, will start out from Limehouse Memorial Hall, passing the historic limestone kilns (proposed as a National Historic Site), continue along the Black Creek Side Trail, turn back along the Main Trail through "Hole-the-Wall" and finish back at Limehouse Memorial Hall.

The total distance is about 5 kilometres or 1½ hours. Hikes will leave each hour starting at 10 a.m. until 3 p.m. Each one will begin with a brief talk about the Niagara Escarpment and the Bruce Trail Association.

Limehouse Memorial Hall will hold numerous Bruce Trail displays such as a membership table, Bruce Trail General Store, slide and talk shows, and much more. Other organizations and groups participating include The Region of Halton, Heritage Halton, Credit Valley Conservation Authority, and the Limehouse Kiln Society.

Limehouse Memorial Hall volunteers will serve refreshments and all proceeds will go toward the maintenance of this beautiful and historic venue.

Limehouse is located at County Rd. 43 and Fifth Line. The parking lot is below Limehouse School on the right, just before the railway bridge; walk over the bridge to Limehouse Memorial Hall.
