Blooming beautiful Halton Hills

The heat was extreme, but the I skies were clear as Halton Hills opened its gardens, highways and pathways to the judges for Communities in Bloom on July 31. Mayor Kathy Gastle, Manager of Parks and Cemeteries Warren Harris, and judges Norm Duncan and Luc Dethier spent the day on the road examining the heritage, floral displays, and work-in-progress during the day of judging. The numerous stops included Willow Park and the Maud Montgomery Lucy Garden/Garden of the Senses in Norval, Glen Williams' shops and cemetery, Georgetown fairgrounds and homes, and Acton's Laura Dietrich Gardens and Naturalizing Area.

The crew stopped at Limehouse Memorial Hall for lunch and a COGECO interview, where Mary Shier welcomed the visitors with a presentation about the history of the building and local lime kilns. Photo displays of the kilns, as well as other activities that take place at the hall were available for viewing, such as shots of Pumpkinfest, Bruce Trail Day, and the Pancake Breakfast.

Ms. Shier believes that Limehouse is the "hidden jewel of Halton Hills," with the large deposits of limestone along the Niagara Escarpment adding to its beauty. She told the judges that future plans include interpretive signage, protection from the elements, and then reconstruction of the lime history in the area.


