ot many men can say they have looked death in the face and lived to tell the tale, but Charlie Parchem has the distinction of having done just that twice in his

59 years.

Thirty years ago, when Charlie's truck got stuck in the mud, and threw him off the road and into a tree, it broke his neck. He spent three months in the hospital before being declared fit to go home. Mayor at the time Ann MacArthur and Councillor Ivan Hunter recommended Charlie for a job with the Town of Milton's Works Department and Charlie began his 28 year career with the Town of Milton.

"I've done a bit of everything," says Charlie who has lived on Campbell Avenue with his wife Audrey for 36 years. "I've done garbage, snow plowing, tree cutting... if it needed doing, I did it."

All that came to an end for Charlie on January 4, 2002. Working with his nephew, Glenn Hall, he climbed a ladder to tie a rope to the top of a tree and then fell almost 25 feet.

"I hairline fractured five vertebrae in my back and punctured my lungs. I was on life support and the shock of it all brought on a heart attack."

It wasn't until mid February during a visit from his son who flew in from Calgary that Charlie began his trip back to the land of the living.

"He moved his hand for the first time when our son was there," says Audrey. "He was so weak when he came to that he couldn't have lifted his head."

Audrey faced a number a number of difficulties in early 2002. Not only was her husband of 37 years sedated to a near coma state and badly hurt, but two weeks after Charlie's fall, Charlie's mother passed away of a heart attack. Audrey also ended up hospitalized for a week due to stress.

"She went through more than I did," says Charlie, to which Audrey laughingly replied, "He slept through it all."

Charlie, who served as a Lions Club member for 27 years and a volunteer fire fighter for 10 years, has now retired from the Town of Milton. He spends two days a week in physiotherapy in Oakville. While his lungs currently operate at 55% capacity, doctors are hopeful that may one day increase to 60 - 65%. "I miss working in the cherry picker the most," he says. "It could be 20 degrees below zero, it didn't bother me, I just liked being up there. I'd go back steady tomorrow if they'd have me."

Audrey is happy to have her husband home and healthy again. "He only seems to hurt himself every 30 years or so, I know he's safe for the next 30 years," she jokes.

Audrey and Charlie are particularly grateful to everyone who has lent a helpful hand to them this year. "I want to thank all the people who helped the fire department, the ambulance service, and my nephew for alerting them so quickly," says Charlie. "Top of the list is my wife Audrey, and our two sons, Charles and Wayne. Family, neighbours and friends should get a special thanks for

their support and




