Willow Park wins Award of Distinction

Steering Committee received well-deserved recognition on November 9, when the team was presented with the Conservation Award of Distinction. The presentation followed a tour of the Credit River Watershed where many group projects, collaborating with Credit Valley Conservation, were featured.

The award recognized the Committee's leadership in "the conservation and management of Willow Park Ecology Centre, and provision of education and restoration activities related to the Credit River."

Willow Park Ecology Centre, a 5.5 acre education and recreation facility located in Norval, has provid-

ed a focus for nature study and ecological-based education in the Town of Halton Hills since 1999.

The Steering Committee that operates Willow Park, in conjunction with the Town, is a collaboration of nine different organizations. Brian Thomas, Carolyn Martin, David Rose, Don Noble, Gloria Hildebrandt, John Morton, Nicole Pinneau, Tunde Otto-Harris and Coordinator Ruth Kuchinad demonstrated a significant contribution to the progress of the Centre.

"It was unexpected that we'd win this particular award," a pleased Ruth Kuchinad noted. "I submitted the nomination but I was surprised at the level (we reached). There were just two given for this category."

This Steering Committee has gathered funds and people (both volunteer and paid) to build a beautiful

butterfly garden with native species, a compost demonstration area, the Robert Noble Tree Trail, wetlands, a quiet pavilion with surrounding gardens, kiosk and benches, a functioning solar-powered weather station, and "riverine" features such as LUNKERS structures to maintain the cold water fishery of the West Branch of the Credit River (Silver Creek).

The educational side of the Ecology Centre has been promoted through an Education Resource Binder used in area schools, interpretive pamphlets that provide guides to the Centre's features, a web site (www.willowparkecology.com), a quarterly newsletter, summer camp and community learning events.

"The committee is currently working on producing a five year strategic plan for 2003 to 2007 that
