Building new schools in Halton

A fter months of hard work, data collection and more than a few harsh words, the Halton District School Board finally has its road map for the next 20 years in place.

The Board of Directors formally approved the Capital Strategic Plan (CSP), its blueprint for school openings and closings, on February 8th, 2003.

In Halton, approximately 44 schools will be built in the next two decades. Milton and Georgetown both have new elementary schools opening in September 2003. Milton School Trustee, Erica Andrew, questions the size of these proposed schools, each of which will have an approximate capacity of 900 students through the use of portables and port-a-paks (portable units linked together by a common corridor and attached to a school).

Erica Andrew also asked Dr.

Dusty Papke, Director of
Education, to identify the problems
inherent for Milton. "Growth in
Milton is so rapid that we can't possibly build schools fast enough,"
Dr. Papke said. "We will yo-yo in
Milton because of the rapid growth."


Gerry Cullen, Superintendent of Facilities and Services, added, "In rapidly growing communities like Milton...we may need to build a school, then build a second school, and move students there."

A public meeting held on February 11th attracted only nine parents, eight of whom represented Georgetown schools. While Milton will see a number of schools built over the next decade, Georgetown will only see new elementary schools built in 2003, 2008 and 2017. Also, Georgetown will have to wait until 2016 before seeing a new secondary school built. Building a new school costs approximately \$7-\$8-million. Chairwoman of the Board and Georgetown School Trustee, Ethel Gardiner, sympathized with frustrated parents and re-iterated the Board's commitment to build new schools as quickly as finances would allow. She also promised the best education possible to all students in Halton, saying, "It doesn't matter what building the kids are in. It's the quality of the programs we can offer to them that is important."

The Board of Education's CSP

had to be revised to accommodate statistics that showed growth in Halton is not as rapid as was initially expected. "The Plan that we had was too aggressive on the construction side," explained Gerry Cullen. "We're seeing demographic differences that we're not used to. We find ourselves having to come up with plans that are transitional." Statistics show that Halton is seeing an increase in multi-family homes and an increase in the number of families purchasing homes. However, Halton residents are putting off starting their families until later in life.

"This is a conservative plan," pointed out Superintendent of Business Carla Kisko. "We have hopes of grants becoming available, but you don't build hope into your Plan. This is a Plan based on today's information. It's a very conservative cash flow model." Superintendent Kisko also pointed out that the Plan would be reviewed on a yearly basis using actual enrolment figures in October of each year. "We will never lose touch with all the fluctuating community demographics."

Brockville Bengals Beat


