Halton launches legal action against Ontario government

The proposed mid-peninsula A highway, which would go from the QEW near Niagara Falls, around Hamilton and to Highway 407 in Burlington, is expected to have profound indirect implications for north Halton. The concerns are so significant that on May 28, the Region decided to allocate \$75,000 to support the City of Burlington in legal action against the province. The intention is to prohibit the Minister of the Environment from approving the environmental assessment terms of reference.

The new transportation project has three declared goals that follow Smart Growth principles: to improve safety and efficiency, support economic growth, and promote a healthy environment. Yet Conservation Halton states that the highway "will lead to urban sprawl, increased traffic congestion, increased air pollution, loss of natural heritage features and loss of prime agricultural lands."

An initial study having been done, the project has now moved

into the second phase, which sets the environmental assessment terms of reference. The City of Burlington, Conservation Halton, the Niagara Escarpment Commission and the Coalition on the Niagara Escarpment (CONE) have all called for a full environmental assessment on the proposed highway to include an examination of such alternatives as rail and transit.

Patrick Murphy, Halton Commissioner of Region's Planning and Public Works, has that Halton's recommended than other municipalities Burlington also be consulted. Furthermore, he has called for "a transportation work plan to assess in greater detail the various alternatives/combination of alternatives and impacts of transit, goods movement, and tolling in the Halton portion of the study."

Yet the government's
Transportation Needs Assessment
Study dismisses public transit:
"Bus, rail and ferry services provide
transportation choice and the

means to reduce automobile use, however these modes cannot address the diverse user needs nor significantly alleviate QEW traffic congestion."

M.P.P. Ted Chudleigh is of a similar mind. In a recent column for the Milton Chamber of Commerce's publication, he declares: "Alternative types of transit, such as ferries or a rail corridor, do not provide the development potential that this project will achieve. The real benefit is the economic growth that will occur along the entire route."

when asked about these comments, Mr. Chudleigh discusses the various highway options, saying his preference is the one that joins the various alternatives of alternatives the 401 as the route through the Halton. Public transit alternatives no longer seem to be under consideration by the government, despite government's concern by others.

"CONE is not satisfied that the Needs Assessment has justified the need for a new highway," states




