## Rick Malboeuf runs for Milton Mayor


ick Malboeuf says "our town Lis no longer the Milton of even five years ago," while declaring his nomination for Milton's chief position. "We need a mayor who understands the challenges we face and who is prepared to deal with them. My experiences in the private sector and in government have provided me with the qualifications needed to be that mayor."

Mr. Malboeuf's political experience spans two terms as the Milton and Regional Councillor for Wards 2 and 4. His positions include: vice-chairman of the Regional Health and Social Services Committee, vice-president of Halton Community Housing, vice-chairman of the Milton Community Services Committee, and member of the Halton Regional Police Services Board, the Ambulance Advisory Committee, and the Milton Citizens Consultation Committee.

He mentions several achievements he's proud of. "I have worked and lobbied extremely hard to improve the ambulance service," he says. "Milton now has two full-time,

24-hour ambulances. We will soon have two fully-equipped ambulance stations, one in Campbellville and the other in urban Milton."

The fire department has been another area of concern. "Upon first being elected to council, I realized that our fire-fighting capabilities were inadequate," he explains, "and to improve our service we




would have to move to a full-time service. We are now close to achieving the minimum level of service standards set by the Office of the Fire Marshall, but we still have a way to go to be at the level Miltonians want and deserve."

Mr. Malboeuf also was key in recommending a new bylaw that would regulate smoking in all public and work places. Although the final bylaw "has flaws that must be corrected," observes Mr. Malboeuf, "it still offers Milton residents more protection from the hazards of tobacco smoke than did the previous regulations."

Finally, Mr. Malboeuf says that he brought an end to Milton Council decisions being made in closed-door sessions.

A 16-year resident of Milton, he is a married father of four and grandfather of two. One of Mr. Malboeuf's leisure activities is playing softball in the Milton Men's Slo-Pitch League.

His plans for his term as mayor include the improvement of emergency services and lowering the crime rate. "What I have done for ambulance and fire, I will do for policing," Mr. Malboeuf states. He also plans to revitalize the downtown areas of Milton and Campbellville, and to make Council, he says, "more open, efficient, cost-effective and taxpayer-friendly."
