

## Ted Chudleigh bids for MPP re-election

Halton's MPP Ted Chudleigh will run again in the next provincial election. "Re-elect me only if you think I've done a good job," he says. "Is Ontario better off today than it was in 1995? Will

Ontario be better off under the Conservatives and the platform that we've put forward, or will it be better off under the Liberals? If you look at the two platforms, ours is sustainable. Our calculation of

their policies will increase spending by about \$12 billion. That's a huge increase. You have to ask yourself where that money's going to come from."

Mr. Chudleigh lists his personal accomplishments in government as setting up the Great Lakes Heritage Coast as a large tourist area, voting for protection of the Oak Ridges Moraine a year before

his government developed a plan to protect it, promoting the Responsible Care Program for the safe disposal of chemicals and, most recently, revising the Ontario and bile Insurance Act to mitigate automobile insurance increases.

Closer to home, Mr.

Chudleigh is proud of helping individuals who have had difficulties accessing the right government departments or appropriate health services. "I've also been involved in obtaining funds for local projects within the riding of Halton," he adds. These include an expansion of the QEW, an overpass for the Third Line at the QEW, a new recreation centre for Georgetown South, Mountsberg Conservation Area's new visitors centre and the renewal of Milton's mill pond.

His plans for the future term,

he explains, "depend on where the Premier puts me." He mentions his interest in health, especially getting control of the number of health-care cards, which he says exceed the population of Ontario by about four million. "There might be some fraud," he suggests.

Other issues of concern to him are the promised mortgage-interest tax-deduction; the teachers' right to

strike; providing more doctors, nurses and nurse practitioners; and keeping a balanced budget.

With family roots in the area going back to 1955, Mr. Chudleigh currently lives in the Georgetown area. The father

of three, he has seven grandchildren. His election in 1995 was his first involvement in politics and he looks forward to a second term in government.

"Our policies and the direction that we've taken Ontario in the last eight years is the right one," he believes. "We're on the right track. I think most Ontarians would agree with that. They want to continue with growth, prosperity, reinvestment in health care, education, community safety and the environment."
