Halton Hills firefighters achjeve Tanker Shuttle Accreditation

s of July 31, the fire department of Halton Hills has joined Milton in achieving the Shuttle Tanker Superior Accreditation. This means that the fire department has demonstrated to the Fire Underwriters Survey (FUS) an acceptable level of fire suppression service in rural areas. Three tankers are now available to pump a minimum of 900 litres of water a minute for two hours. As a result, some rural property owners may be eligible for insurance premium reductions.

In March 2003 the Halton Hills fire department received a tanker new

and, since then, both full and part-time staff trained and conducted test runs for the accreditation evaluation. On July 31, FUS personnel monitored a demonstration on the Sixth Line, and informed firefighters that they had passed

the test.

"The investment made by council in enhancing the operational capabilities of the Halton Fire Protection Prevention Services has created the opportunity for a significant economic benefit for rural property owners," states Larry Brassard, Chief of Operations, in a report to council.

Both Mr. Brassard and Milton's Fire Chief, Harold Penson, suggest that rural property owners contact their insurance brokers or agents about possible premium reductions. Insurance savings depend on many factors and may not be available to all rural

property owners. The new accreditation is valid for residents within eight kilometres by road of a fire station, and within five kilometres for commercial properties.

Insurance companies set their own ratings and may treat this accreditation differently. Some companies offer a discount to a maximum amount. If this is the case, and owners already have the advantage of full discounts, then no further discount would be allowed for the increased fire protection. However, other companies acknowledge the accreditation by changing the territory of the prop-

> erty, as if it were in an urban area, and give reductions if all conditions are Other met. companies don't give clear consideration to the Superior Tanker Shuttle Accreditation.

Rural property owners are advised

to contact their insurance companies with their distance in kilometres from the responding fire hall. To determine which hall this is, Halton Hills residents should call the fire department's business line at 905-877-1133 with their address and municipal number. They will be told which fire hall is their primary response station, the one in Georgetown on Maple Avenue or the one in Acton at Churchill Road. They should then drive to the station to note the distance in kilometres.

Although perhaps inconvenient, following this advice from insurance professionals could result in significant reductions in insurance premiums.

As well as his commitment to conservation, Mr. Lee is also interested in maintaining a reasonable tax base and proudly states, "We have the lowest tax rates in the GTA.

Mr. Lee believes that being part of the fabric of the community is critical to his success as a councillor since he has "to deal with the public head on." He explains: "You don't do this job alone. We are fortunate in Halton. We have a large participant rate from citizens." He points to the Nassagaweya Community Consultation Committee, a group of local residents who meet once a month to discuss Regional and municipal issues including everything from zoning problems to policing concerns. He is very impressed with the many new constituents who "bite into an issue and get involved."

Councillor Lee explains that his reason for getting involved with politics in the first place is the reason why he continues to be involved. He cherishes and values the spirit of the community, and wants to ensure that continues. Furthermore, he notes, "I feel that the area is somewhat unique, and I'd like to keep it that way."



