
### Rock'n' and roll'n' at Georgetown's Classic Car Show

#### Halton Sketches Revisited:

Historical Tales of People and Events in North Halton

eaders of The North Halton L Compass know that we have a long-time love of history, as shown by our numerous articles on various subjects, and especially the inclusion of the popular Shoebox series. One kindred spirit to us is John McDonald of Milton. Mr. McDonald has been involved with family lore and folksy subjects since 1974 when Hartley Coles, editor of The Georgetown Independent (now editor of The New Tanner), approached him to pen a series of articles on the people of Halton Hills. Within two years the popular series grew to become a book, Halton Sketches, and has since gone through three more printings as Halton Sketches Revisited.


The tales mainly deal with Glen Acton, Georgetown, Williams, Limehouse and Norval,

Esquesing Township. There were "excellent mill sites on the waterways which wind through the area to Lake Ontario, and all are surrounded by very rich agricultural land," Mr. McDonald notes. His historical overviews first pinpoint Halton and then delve into the five locations, covering topics such as L.M. Montgomery's residence in Norval, Beaumont Knitting in Glen Williams and Georgetown's Irish entrepreneurs. There are some fascinating facts in this collection of stories. Do you know where Timothy Eaton worked in Glen Williams? Or that John Brain's beer that was brewed in Hornby had such a high alcohol content that the clients complained, and Brain reluctantly reduced it? These tidbits and many more are contained in the lavishly illustrated book where black and white photos and maps all part of what used to be enhance the vision of the past.

Halton Sketches Revisited is nicely designed and offers an engaging writing style that is a sincere depiction of the flavour of the area: It's a book to treasure whether you're an avid or armchair historian.

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
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# Donna Danielli's Just Kidding

The Town of Halton Hills has a number of programs for kids beginning this month. Youth Fitness is for 13 to 18-year-olds who are looking to have fun and get in shape. 


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
