

COMMUNITY CORNERSTONE

CHRIS BURNETT

"My mother was an artist. I think it's in the blood," remarks folk artist, Chris Burnett. "I've always drawn or painted. And I've enjoyed many different crafts over the years: weaving, macramé, sculpting and carving decoys."

Upon entry to the Burnett property, it becomes immediately evident that an artist and great green thumb lives in the Campbellville area home. Lush flowers, borders and trees grace the spot, casting intriguing shadows in the various back gardens. Peeping from beneath the roses or standing sentinel by rock walls is an eclectic mix of creatures including a gargoyle, Buddha, heron and rabbit.

Inside the house the space is well suited to Ms. Burnett where wood and stone, plants and pets form another natural environment. It's here that her folk art fits in so well. The rustic yet extremely detailed images draw the eye, making the viewer hard-pressed not to linger.

"I have a kind of Grandma Moses style, but with more detail," she says, smiling. "I set the image with real people, places and pets. I always try to add humour too."

Looking at a limited edition Burnett print is like looking into the past and present. To accomplish her work, Chris goes out to her subject spot and takes numerous photographs, makes notes and then brings the research home to her studio. She creates acrylic originals, most recently using board as a backing medium, and often fashions old windows to frame the work.

"I can refinish the windows and use them as a frame," she adds. "I cut the board to fit and make my painting on that." That way another dimension is added as the audience gazes through a picture window and views an enchanting farm scene.

Her first print of the village of Campbellville, Heralds of Spring, was created from photos taken in 1986 and was three years in the making. "It's a present-day picture. I'm interested in the relationship between people and animals and history. I try to incorporate as much as I can." Children skating on the frozen pond, barking dogs, sly cats, Holsteins at the hay, frisky horses and the old Stokes barn that was recently torn down sur-

round the focal point of the Opera Emporium. The home of John Campbell, the first settler and namesake of the village, also graces Ms. Burnett's picture of the small hamlet.

Two other favourites are Arawana and Milton Fall Fair. Arawana in particular has a deft use of light in a night scene that makes the image of the Chisholm farm between the escarpment bluffs glow with unusual beauty. The Iroquoian name, Arawana, is echoed in visual elements across the cliffs where a warrior, wolf, deer, turtle, fish, rabbit and mask are found. Along with immortalizing in her work her Morgan horse of 37 years and her various dogs, Ms. Burnett always adds hidden elements "that get people really absorbed into the painting. The funny thing is that many of the images appeared on their own like the squaw with a papoose, the horse and the bear."

The most recent piece of Chris Burnett art is the poster for the Milton Fall Fair. "Evelyn Oates, a past president of the fair, approached me to do a poster for 2003, the fair's 150th anniversary. It's going on the cover of the program," Ms. Burnett explains. The bright, lively poster follows the layout of a family portrait, except the group is made up of not only people but also farm animals.

"I tried to represent all the classes and events right from the livestock, grains, arts and rides to the horticultural classes. I always make sure my work is Canadian, and it usually has something distinctive like a flag, or the Canadian hockey jerseys or baseball shirts. In the back is a couple from 1853 to represent the past. There are some humourous elements too, like the horse ruffling the boy's hair and the goat chewing on the pumpkin."

The bold colours and delicate style of Ms. Burnett's work portray a slice of rural Ontario life, far removed from the bustle of 21st century living even though the images are not removed from this era. It's this imagination and absorbing detail that intrigue her audience - buyers who hope she will continue to record local life before it vanishes into the past.


