

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
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## Munsch bunch launches book

Classes for seven to nine years will run from 6:00 to 7:00 p.m. while classes for 10 to 12-year-olds will run from 7:00 to 8:00 p.m. This program, taking place at Centennial Middle School, offers instruction in a number of mediums, including paint, drawing

and clay. All great artists get messy
