Milton draws an array of candidates

he November 10 election has drawn an astonishingly large number of candidates in Milton. The only acclaimed candidate is Ward 1 and 3 Regional Councillor Barry Lee. While profiles of new candidates have previously run in The North Halton Compass, by the time nominations were closed on September 26 there still remained eight more candidates to be provided with a list of questions asking what skills they would bring to the job of Councillor and what they believed were outstanding issues of

Ward 1:

the election.

Lou Medeiros: Employed by the Peel Board of Education for 15 years as an English teacher, Mr. Medieros is also Founding President of the Meadowvale Neighbourhood Centre of Peel, President of the Milton Youth Council and Chair for Parent Teacher Council Committee of Our Lady of Victory Elementary School. He sees the outstanding short term issues as improving parking control, enhancing municipal by-law enforcement and increased communication with residents. Long-term issues include expanded public transit, improved police, snow removal, sidewalk and biking trails, and enhanced communication between already established communities and new sub-divisions.

John Korta: As a Senior Manager, Finance and Logistics at UPS Supply Chain Solutions, Mr. Korta feels his involvement with budgeting, contract review, solution design, treasury functions, client negotiations, steering committees and business planning will serve him well if elected. He cites the issues as being rapid growth, road infrastructure, industrial development, local property taxes, pedestrian paths and the bicycle path net-

Pfeiffer: Mr. Pfeiffer's 35 years in sales and marketing, and his 13 years experience as President and CEO of Warnaco Canada, an apparel distribution firm, have given him experience in organizing, problem solving, and sales negotiations as well as the planning and administration of a business employing over 700 people. His issues include future development plans and their effect on the Niagara Escarpment, driveways of insufficient length, bike paths, increased traffic flow and balancing the needs of existing residents with those of new and future residents.

Andrew Garrod: Mr. Garrod feels that his skills as a good listener, articulate speaker, objective problem solver and analytical skills will serve him well if elected. Key concerns for him in the election are bicycle paths in the new subdivisions, bus service to the new development, the preservation of greenspace and the reexamination of the town's policy on cosmetic pesticide use.

Also running in Ward 1 are Greg Nelson and the incumbent Councillors Brian Penman and Richard Day.

Ward 2:

Beverly Faulknor: A semiretired teacher, Mrs. Faulknor brings her experience as a mother, board member, association president, fundraiser, committee chair and vice principal, giving her leadership and problem solving skills she feels will serve her well if elected. Outstanding issues for her include the provision of recreational, leisure and cultural facilities, the management of new growth, and suitable and affordable housing facilities for seniors.

Also running in Ward 2 are Jim Timbers, Jennifer Mirosolin, Colin

Best, Mark Curtis, Mike Boughton and incumbent Councillor Art Melanson. Former incumbent Councillor Wally Hunter has decided to retire from politics.

Ward 3:

Jan Mowbray: Mrs. Mowbray serves as the Chair of the Milton Safety Committee, has been involved with the Community Road Watch Program, initiated drive-safe programs for high school teens, and is a current member of the Town of Milton's Community Services Advisory Committee. Issues cited by Mrs. Mowbray include the huge population increase in urban Milton that shrinks the percentage of the overall population of rural Ward 3, garbage pick up, road safety involving increasing traffic at Mohawk Race Track, and safety for bicyclists

and pedestrians.

Also running in Ward 3 are Rick Matchett and incumbent Councillors Ken Keates and Cindy Lunau.

Ward 4:

Darlene Wasilkowsky: With 15 years commercial banking experience, four years as the general manager of the Historical Downtown of Milton, and nine years as the events co-ordinator for the Town of Milton, Mrs. Wasilkowsky is confident her skills combined with organization and common sense will serve her well if elected. She has concerns about a lack of businesses in town that fill the void of family entertainment, such as theatres, bowling or an art complex, and the need to attract more commercial and industrial businesses to Milton to provide a wider array of shopping choices.

Don Gordon: Mr. Gordon has owned and operated his own businesses for most of his life, served as City Councillor for Elliot Lake for two years (before his move back to Milton), is a director for the F. Davey Home for the Aged, a member of the Masonic Lodge and a Shriner. For him the issues are ensuring that regional councillors represent voters concerns at regional council meetings and on-going zoning and by-law issues.



• IN FISCAL RESPONSIBILTY: Milton does not have a revenue problem: It has a spending problem. Council must learn to prioritize its spending and stop wasting taxpayers' money for political purposes. • IN LESS BUREAUCRACY: Rick wants to reduce the red tape of local government and to make Town Hall more user and taxpayer friendly.


