
Is Halton's biosolids program spreading lies?

alton's Biosolids Recycling Program has been providing the Region's agricultural community with biosolids fertilizer for over 23 years. As landfills have become overcrowded and concerns about air quality are increasing, biosolids offer the opportunity to use these treated, nutrient rich by-products of wastewater treatment plants to promote crop growth. But according to Laurie Eagles, the hazards of this program far outweigh the benefits.

Mrs. Eagles appeared as a delegation before Halton Regional Council on September 17 to speak on the Region's new report on the "Biosolids Management Centre Monitoring Environmental Program Enhancements." "This report is a sham. The information is inaccurate and incomplete," accused the Burnhamthorpe Road resident, whose family dwelling neighbours the W.A. Bill Johnson Biosolids Management Centre. (BMC).

The BMC was the recent target of a health hazard investigation by the Region which included an environmental audit and an investigation into a biosolids tank liner breach in November 2002. Although the investigation shows a negligible risk of impact to ground water and claims that the occurrences of odours at the site have seldom been found to be biosolids, a number of recommendations are being made to further protect the



Eagles told Council. Mrs. Eagles has logged numerous complaints with the Region about the facility over the past few years, citing health problems, quality of living issues and water concerns, all of which she claims have fallen on deaf ears. "Halton Region, the Planning and Public Works Committee and now the Health Department continue to protect themselves at the expense of the residents," she accused. In a separate letter to the Council she stated that the investigations numerous recommendations serve as further proof that previously dictated practices were inadequate. "This region is caught between a rock and a hard place," she wrote. "Considering the growth and projected growth, coupled with diminished available farmland to dispose of product, the Wastewater Master Plan is in dire trouble."

As Mrs. Eagles is involved in litigation with the Region on the issue of the biosolids, Regional Council chose to receive her deputation for consideration and declined to comment on it at the Council meeting.
