



This month I'm going to tell a story about my family. I have learned through my parents that when a challenging situation comes your way in life you learn from it and better your life as well as the lives of others. I hope our situation will help at least one person avoid any unnecessary pain and discomfort.

As many of our friends and neighbors are aware, my father has been very ill for the last three weeks. On September 19 Roy Curtis, my dad, suffered from two palmary embolisms, which are blood clots in the lung. My father went into hospital on September 16 as he was diagnosed with lung cancer and the doctors were going in to remove the tumour. The surgery was very successful, but three days later Dad found himself unable to breath. The incredible team at St Joseph's Hospital in Hamilton rushed him to the ICU, immediately sedated him, put him on a respirator, and we found him Friday night in very critical condition on double life support. He made it through the night - something the doctors were not expecting

- then he made it the next 48 hours (also not expected), and then 9 days later he actually flickered his eyes. Slowly, but surely, we had our dad back. Actually, as I write this on October the 8th, he is on his way home. My father is the most incredible man I know so I am not surprised that he was able to fight his way back to us and win.

My message is this: My mom, who is also incredibly strong and determined, did not know any bank account information or investments, and she could not access his computer emails or banking on-line because she does not like the computer. Now, my mom has me, which she said she was very thankful for. I obviously manage their portfolio and know where Dad banks, his banker and even the codes to his computer. As I sat there in that terrible situation in the early days, I thanked God that I could help my mom with whatever came our way. I need to spread the word to a spouse that is not involved in the every day life of financial dealings of their household; everyone has one. Both spouses should sit together at least once a year

to update account numbers, contact persons of their banks, account number and contact persons of Investment portfolios, all codes for computer systems and combinations for safes and safety deposit boxes. Make sure Living Power of Attorneys are updated so that a person can act on your behalf.

I never thought I would find my dad in this situation even though I often see this in my career as a financial planner. You never think it's going to happen to you. PLEASE make the steps today to avoid any other pain and stress so that you are able to focus on what is important during a crisis and that's your family.

Thank you to everyone for all your prayers. You know who you are.




