Dufferin wants bigger piece of the rock

n November 17 at 10 a.m. a meeting in Milton's Council Chambers could mark the beginning of the end for 205 acres of escarpment land. A joint board made up of members of the Environmental Review Tribunal and the Ontario Municipal Board will hold a preliminary hearing regarding Dufferin Aggregates' intention to expand its Milton quarry:

Dufferin plans to extend the quarry by 83 hectares, or 205 acres, to the north and northeast of the existing quarry, and to mine 70 hectares or 173 acres. This land is located in both the Towns of Milton and Halton Hills as it covers both sides of the Town Line south of 15th Side Road. Sixty million tonnes of stone are expected to be quarried here over 10 to 12 years.

involves applications for the following: To amend the Niagara Escarpment Plan; obtain a development permit from the Niagara Escarpment Commission (NEC); amend the official plans of the Regional Municipality of Halton, the Town of Halton Hills and the Town of Milton; amend Milton's zoning by-law; and obtain a licence from the Ministry of Natural Resources (MNR) to operate a quar-

There is objection to the proposal as a whole from the groups Coaltion on the Niagara Escarpment (CONE), Protect Our Water and Resources Environmental (POWER), and Save the Niagara Escarpment (SaNE), and from individual citizens, including at least one petition of more than 2,200 signa-

This application seems to have been triggered by the sale of land by the Town of Halton Hills. In 2000, during the last six months of Marilyn Serjeantson's tenure as Mayor, the This significant proposal Town sold a portion of St. Helena Road to Dufferin for the paltry sum of \$3,645 plus the Town's legal costs. A professional estimate of the value of the aggregate beneath this road is in the millions of dollars. In January 2001, Dufferin made the application

currently under review.

Under the Niagara Escarpment Plan, the subject lands are currently designated Escarpment Rural Area and are an essential part of the Escarpment corridor. They provide a buffer to more ecologically sensitive areas of the Escarpment. Dufferin is applying to have this designation changed to Mineral Resource Extraction Area.

According to the 2002 staff report of the NEC, expanding the Milton quarry "will fragment the remaining substantially continuous natural environment in the vicinity of the Niagara Escarpment in the Town of Milton. There will be no continuous strip of natural environment or natural corridor/ecological link from the brow at the south end to the northerly extent of the applicant's landholdings."

Members of POWER point out that the Escarpment is not the only location with high-quality aggregate. A report from the NEC indicates three times the amount of comparacontinued on page 4



Local zebra opens Milton Sports Centre


